For the last few weeks, Mrs. Carnie has been coming to the K/1/2 class to teach social-emotional skills using the

Kimochi program. Students have been learning about how

- Respectful: Use a respectful voice, face, words and actions; listen to upset feelings
- ▼ Responsible: Speak up for self or others; admit and own mistakes
- Resilient: Work through emotion alone or with help; bounce back from difficult moments
- Compassionate and Kind: Have empathy or concern for others; look for moments to be kind to self and others.

This week, they met Huggtopus! Huggtopus is all smiles and hugs. She is affectionate and strong and sometimes gets a little carried away by her big, friendly personality. Huggs always means well, but she has to learn about respecting others' boundaries. Her favorite number is 8, and she has a special fondness for bubble gum. Huggtopus feels proud because she has six legs. Huggtopus feels silly most of the time. Huggtopus feels frustrated when her friends don't feel silly or happy. Huggs shows students how to behave appropriately when she is frustrated.

JORDAN'S PRINCIPLE— THE HISTORY BEHIND MAY 11

Jordan's Principle is a child-first principle intended to resolve government jurisdictional disputes concerning payment for services to First Nations children when the service is available to all other children. It was named in memory of Jordan River Anderson, a young boy from Norway House Cree Nation, who spent more than two years unnecessarily in hospital while Canada and Manitoba argued over payment for his at-home care. In Jordan's case, the two governments could not agree on payment because Jordan was First Nations and, thus, left him in hospital while they argued over payment. Tragically, Jordan died at five years of age after waiting more than two years for both governments to resolve their dispute. In December 2007, Parliament unanimously supported Private Member's bill Jordan's Principle 296 stating that "in the opinion of the House, the government should immediately adopt a child-first principle, based on Jordan's Principle, to resolve jurisdictional disputes involving the care of First Nations children". The achievement was so great that the Canadian Public Health Association named Jordan's Principle as one of the 12 most important achievements in the history of Canadian public health.
