The Story of Orange Shirt Day

The Legacy of the St. Joseph Mission (SJM) Residential School

Orange Shirt Day is a legacy of the St. Joseph Mission (SJM) Residential School (1891-1981) Commemoration Project and Reunion events that took place in Williams Lake, BC, Canada, in May 2013. This project was the vision of Esketemc (Alkali Lake) Chief Fred Robbins, who is a former student himself. It brought together former from the Secwepemc, and St'at'imc Nations along District, the Mayors and and civic organizations in the

former student himself. It students and their families silhqot'in, with the Cariboo Regional municipalities, School Districts Cariboo Region.

The events were designed to commemorate the residential school experience, to witness and honour the healing journey of the survivors and their families, and to commit to the ongoing process of reconciliation. Chief Justice Murray Sinclair challenged all of the participants to keep the reconciliation process alive, as a result of the realization that every former student had similar stories.

Orange Shirt Day is a legacy of this project. As spokesperson for the Reunion group leading up to the events, former student Phyllis (Jack) Webstad told her story of her first day at residential school when her shiny new orange shirt, bought by her grandmother, was taken from her see a six year old pint. grandmother, was taken from her as a six-year old girl.

The annual Orange Shirt Day on September 30th opens the door to global conversation on all aspects of Residential Schools. It is an opportunity to create meaningful discussion about the effects of Residential Schools and the legacy they have left behind. A discussion all Canadians can tune into and create bridges with each other for reconciliation. A day for survivors to be reaffirmed that they matter, and so do those that have been affected. Every Child Matters, even if they are an adult, from now on from now on.

The date was chosen because it is the time of year in which children were taken from their homes to residential schools, and because it is an opportunity to set the stage for anti-racism and anti-bullying policies for the coming school year. It is an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come.

It all started in the Cariboo, and as a result, School District No. 27 was chosen by the First Nations Education Steering Committee (FNESC) to pilot curriculum changes for all Grade 5 and Grade 10 students reflecting the residential school experience, which have now been implemented province-wide.



To Families and School Staff: What you need to know about measles

Measles is spreading in BC right now. This letter has important information to help keep your child, your family, and our schools safe. Measles is a sickness that spreads easily, but we can help stop it with vaccines and knowing what to do if we're exposed to it.

Vaccines help protect us

Getting the measles vaccine is the best way to stay safe!

People are protected if they:

- got two measles vaccines (shots) after turning 1 year old,
- were born before 1970, or
- · were diagnosed with measles before.

What measles looks like

Symptoms of measles show up **7 to 21 days** after being near someone who has measles (if you catch the virus). These symptoms include:

- Fever
- Cough
- Runny nose
- Red or watery eyes
- A rash that starts on the face and neck, then spreads

Measles spreads through the air when someone with measles breathes, coughs or sneezes. Measles can make people very sick by causing problems with breathing or in the brain, and sometimes it can be deadly.

If you think your child has measles symptoms

- Do not send your child to school.
- Call your doctor or the Northern Health Virtual Clinic at 1-844-645-7811.
- Try to keep your child away from other people during this time.
- If you need to go to the doctor or hospital, call ahead so they can get ready.

If someone has measles

They should stay home and away from other people until at least 4 days after the rash starts. This helps stop the sickness from spreading. If you need to go to the doctor or hospital, please call first so the staff can get ready.

Extra care for some people

Measles can be very dangerous for people who are not protected, and who are pregnant or have weak immune systems. If you are worried about the health of your child or family member related to measles, call **your doctor** or the **Northern Health Virtual Clinic** right away. They can help you get care and medicine to stay safe.
