On Wednesday, May 14, FLES students were treated to a 45 minute musical performance by Alvin and Andrew called **Dumpsta**

Dragons. Eight songs were performed on sitar, shakuhachi, didgeridoo, kalimba, as well as homemade inventions, the Moroccan hockey stick, singing spoon, and Persian tennis racket. There was an explanation of historical and cultural significance of each instrument as well as the inspiration behind each invention. Andrew demonstrated how to turn a spoon into a guitar, with a brief explanation of the physical principle involved. The students listened carefully, learned about music from various cultures, and had fun.

- Sitar—ancient 20-stringed Indian lute
- Shakuhachi—Japanese bamboo flute
- Kalimba—African finger piano/harp
- Didgeridoo—ancient Australian wind instrument, oldest instrument in the world
- Moroccan hockey stick, Persian tennis racket, and singing spoon—homemade invented instruments based on traditional instruments from other cultures.

Music is everywhere!

On Wednesday, May 21, 2025, the Grades 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7's, with Mr. Hogarth, Mrs. Hogarth, and Mr. Gooding, a volunteer, all went to Granisle to release the coho salmon fry FLES has been working so hard to grow from fertilized eggs. The bus left at 8:55 AM and the students met with Fisheries biologists to learn more about the salmon life-cycle. Afterwards, Mr. and Mrs. Hogarth treated the students to a lunch purchased from "Sam's Restaurant", and showed their students what the town of Granisle and Babine Elementary Secondary School were like.



FLES students were invited to Decker Lake Elementary School which hosted the performance of the play, *Where Have All The Buffalo Gone?* The performance followed two Métis souls through four love stories in four distinct periods of Métis history. They bore witness to the emergence of the Métis nations across the plains, the robust colonization that arises from the fur trade, the disappearance of the buffalo and the political uprising of the Métis Association of Alberta. The story begins during creation amongst the stars and ends in the present day.

Where Have All The Buffalo Gone? specifically shared scenarios from the Callihoo family's stories, incorporating fiddle music, jigging and a life size buffalo puppet. Inspired by historical events of the Métis people of Canada, this original play for young audiences explores the loves, the losses and the fight of Treaty 6's Métis people – and their love and kinship to the buffalo.

Qualifying races have begun, dutifully scrutineered by our own Race Director and race steward, Mrs. Wilson, and our FLES students are almost ready to race their cars.
